**Ethical Norms and Human Existential Foundations**

Ethical norms work in the communal phenomena of human activities. 'Communal' means a gathering of people acting in concert, in which there are certain common rules working consciously or unconsciously among people related to each other in some way. The simple rule, for example, is that even when we walk on the street, we avoid intentionally crashing into other pedestrians so that abusive collisions don't occur. This rule is trivial and yet invaluable.

From the viewpoint of human existential foundations, the concept of such a simple rule has much import. Such rules in human gatherings amount to the appreciable and ulterior ethical rules which bring order to the world in which we live. They are called ethical norms.

Human existential foundations, which are *a priori* to human existence, explain the order of human life and human common sense which provides the universal norms of human conduct and ethical judgement in our everyday life.
